Inclusion is a culture where people, systems, structures, and practices support everyone's right to be welcome, recognized, respected, valued, psychologically safe, and honored.



Skeleton: Femur











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Get Started Say YES to Build an Engaging Lecture



1. Is my lecture digitally accessible?



2. Does my lecture have all bias removed in its narratives, imagery, and scholarship?



3. Can my students answer, "What's in it for me?" when seeing and hearing my lecture's objectives?



4. Is my lecture free from distractions including outdated, and potentially offensive, terminology?



5. Is the physical environment where I deliver my lecture appropriate for all learners? What about the modality?



6. Am I speaking clearly and evenly paced?



7. Am I providing active learning breaks?
